TOWNSHIP PREPARES FOR ITS ROLE IN THE PAPAL VISIT

In late September Southeastern Pennsylvania will be hosting one of the largest gatherings of people in recent memory. With the arrival of Pope Francis to the United States scheduled for September 22, 2015, and the World Meeting of Families beginning the same day in Philadelphia, Upper Gwynedd Township is working with the other agencies involved to ensure that all events go as smoothly as possible. These events culminating on September 26th and 27th, with the arrival of the Pope in Philadelphia, are expected to bring an additional two million people to our area. All hotel rooms in the 5-County area are booked solid for this event. This influx could make travel extremely difficult. Many of the major roadways and arteries in the region are scheduled to be closed for certain time frames making travel problematic. Additionally, SEPTA will be utilizing Pennbrook Station (Church Road) which is one of only three train stations in Montgomery County which will be operating during this time. All train tickets **must be pre-purchased** via SEPTA's website. Please visit Septa's website for updated information. There will also be additional Law Enforcement, Fire, and Emergency Medical Services on standby throughout the duration of the event for everyone's safety. We are asking that all residents use common sense on travel during this time and allow plenty of extra time to get to your destination. 🌟

FIRE COMPANY NEWS

Fire Prevention Week

Fire prevention week is October 4-10 this year. The theme for 2015 is, "Hear the Beep, where you Sleep." The Upper Gwynedd Township Fire Company along

with the Fire Marshal's office wants to remind all residents that they should have a smoke alarm in EVERY bedroom. If you cannot hear the alarm going off while you are asleep, there is a much greater chance that you or your loved ones could be injured by the devastating effects of toxic smoke. It is also imperative that bedroom doors be closed when you are sleeping. This significantly decreases the likelihood of smoke entering the bedroom. If you cannot afford a smoke alarm or need help with



installation, please contact the Upper Gwynedd Township Fire Company for assistance at your residence. During the month of October, members of the Fire Company will be visiting schools and daycares providing Fire Safety information to students.

Please Dig Out Fire Hydrants

The Upper Gwynedd Township Fire Company wants to remind all residents and business owners that in the event of a snow storm, it is important to clear your closest fire hydrant from all snow. The ideal clearance is 3 feet on all sides. This will enable Firefighters to concentrate on establishing a water supply immediately rather than having to dig out the hydrant saving precious time in the event of an emergency. We thank you in advance for your cooperation.



A NOTE FROM THE FIRE MARSHAL ABOUT OUTDOOR BURNING

On July 27, 2015, the Upper Gwynedd Township Board of Commissioners adopted an amendment to Chapter 69 of the Township Code that covers Outdoor Burning, thus allowing for recreational burning. This change was made to bring the Ordinance in line with the International Fire Code as adopted. In the interest of public safety, there are some requirements that must be maintained in order to adequately utilize your recreational fire pit. All recreational fires must be kept a minimum of 25 feet from other combustibles. This means at least 25 feet from your house, deck, shed, or other items that could easily catch fire. The dimensions of any circular fire pit must be no more than 36" in diameter and no more than 24" in height. For any square shaped fire pit, the dimensions must be no more than 32"x32" with the height being no more than 24". Chimineas are also permitted. Any time you are using a recreational fire pit, you must have a means to extinguish the pit readily accessible. This could include a garden hose, dirt, sand, or a 4-A rated fire extinguisher. It should be noted that this Ordinance does NOT mean you may burn yard debris, tree clippings, leaves, etc. You may burn the same wooden logs that would be used in an indoor fireplace. If there are significant winds, a severe drought, or children playing nearby, please realize that this creates a hazardous condition (i.e. Wind blowing smoke from your recreational fire through the neighborhood). The Fire Marshal's office may order the extinguishment of a fire pit at any time if a situation is determined to be hazardous or objectionable. LEAF AND YARD WASTE PROGRAM

Residential waste haulers will be collecting leaf and yard waste again this Fall. You should be receiving written notification of these dates from your hauler.

Residents are advised that they should purchase their own bio-degradable leaf and yard waste collection bags and that haulers are responsible for the collection. Haulers may reject leaf and yard waste in plastic bags or bags that are contaminated with other trash and may limit the number of bags per collection.

Upper Gwynedd Township does not dictate whether or not your hauler bills you for this service. Further, haulers have been advised that they should not charge homeowners who live within developments where the Homeowners' Association contracts privately for the collection and disposal of leaf and yard waste.

Residents are also advised that the Barnside Farm Composting Facility on Haldeman Road in Lower Salford Township provides a drop off site for leaves, grass and yard waste. Call 610-287-8880 for more information.



TIPS FROM ZONING AND CODE ENFORCEMENT

Yard Waste

- Please remember that weeds, brush, and yard waste should never be deposited in the street right-of-way. The only exception is when placed in trash containers for regular pick-up.

Yard Signs

- In the early fall, illegal sign posting seem to increase. Signs are never permitted within the legal rights-of-way of the street or in a manner that could obstruct sight vision at street intersections or where driveways intersect with streets. This is true for all zoning districts within the Township.
- Only contractors who have received a construction permit from the Township are permitted to post their signs on a property. This is limited to a 30 day duration.
- Signs from contractors providing services such as tree service, lawn maintenance, power washing, painting or any type of commercial message are never permitted on residential properties. A permit from the Township is required for any sign located on a commercial or industrial property.

Pool Planning

- It is never too early to start thinking about a new swimming pool. Pools require zoning and building code compliance permits. It is important to allow sufficient time for Township officials to review pool applications, which must also consist of a property survey and grading plan prepared by a licensed professional. Please have your contractor contact the Zoning and Building Departments for additional regulations in order to help expedite the review process. ❄️

SNOW EMERGENCY INFORMATION

Snow Ordinances

Pursuant to the provisions of Ordinance 61-2, as amended, of the Township, during periods of emergency snow conditions, no person shall park a vehicle or permit a vehicle to stand unattended upon any portion of any of the roads within the Township. This is to assist snow plow operators in clearing the streets.

A snow emergency shall be declared by the Township Manager and announced over the radio stations WNPV 1440 and KYW 1060.

As a courtesy to the Township's snow plow operators and neighboring resident's, the Township requests that residents refrain from putting out trash and recycling containers that also hinders snow removal efforts.

Important Announcement About Mailbox Placement

Township work crews have reported that many residents have mailboxes that protrude over the face of the curb and/or over the paved area of Township roads. The Township is taking this opportunity to notify residents that this causes problems during snow removal. Mailboxes must be installed or reinstalled so that they are even with the back (behind the curb to the property side) of the curb line and/or behind the edge of the black top where curbs do not exist. During the winter months when snow plowing operations are taking place, the opportunity that your mailbox could be hit by a plow will be minimized by complying with these regulations. By having your mailbox meet these requirements, the chance of your mailbox being hit will be minimal. Please be advised that should your mailbox not meet the above requirements and damage is done by a Township vehicle or contractor, you will not be compensated nor will your mailbox be replaced. ❄️



CHRISTMAS TREE RECYCLING

12/28/15 THROUGH 1/31/16

The Township will accept undecorated, cut Christmas Trees for recycling beginning December 28th through the end of January. Please follow the arrows on the Parkside Place driveway to the stone pool parking lot to drop off your tree.

RESIDENTIAL BEST MANAGEMENT PRACTICES (BMPs)

Residential BMPs aim to achieve many of the same goals as urban BMPs employed throughout the Township including rate reduction, volume control, and water quality oftentimes with a side benefit of beautification. Here are a few BMPs that homeowners can take advantage of to reap similar benefits on their property.

Rain Barrels

This simple and easy BMP looks to capture runoff from impervious roof structures of homes, garages, sheds, covered porches, etc. This can be achieved by routing existing downspouts to the rain barrels. Capturing runoff means there is a reduced risk of on property flooding, and water collecting around the foundations of structures. Another benefit is that the captured rain water can be used to water lawns and gardens, reducing billable water use. Rain barrels can be made at home inexpensively, or decorative barrels can be purchased and add a rustic touch to any space.




Rain Gardens

A garden can be more than a way to beautify outdoor spaces, attract butterflies, and grow vegetables. A rain garden can have all of the benefits mentioned above with additional benefits of collecting runoff and allowing it to infiltrate. Rain gardens can be used to collect runoff by directing downspouts to the garden, or by positioning them in natural depressions where water naturally collects. Often times rain gardens allow for quicker infiltration of water which can help reduce property flooding. Many different types of plants can be used in rain gardens and typically require little maintenance after they are established. As with other landscaping projects, adding a beautiful and functional piece to a home's landscape can help increase curb appeal and the property value.

Landscaping

There are many choices with regards to landscaping that can help manage residential runoff. The first way addresses hardscapes around a home. Hard surfaces such as concrete patios and asphalt driveways do not allow water to infiltrate and can increase problems related to rainfall runoff. An alternative is to use materials that allow water to infiltrate such as permeable pavers. Permeable pavers are not inherently pervious, but allow the runoff to infiltrate between each paver. Other options include pervious asphalt and concrete, which are the same as their imperious counterparts except that there is a very little amount of fine material used in the mixtures. The removal of fine materials in the mixtures allows runoff to infiltrate through the asphalt and concrete. Of the three options, permeable pavers can be the most aesthetically pleasing. There are many different varieties that come in many shapes sizes and colors. They are very durable and can add a decorative touch that ties together the rest of a home's landscaping.



Plant choice can help with the effects of rain runoff. Plants that have deep root systems help to stabilize and, aerate the soil, as well as encourage infiltration. Plants put around the foundation of homes can help stop erosion around the foundation, and absorb some runoff that may end up near the foundation. Landscaping around the perimeter of the property can serve to reduce runoff entering property and can encourage infiltration



of onsite runoff. All landscaping projects aim to beautify the property, and increase curb appeal, which in turn can make neighborhoods more inviting and increase property value.

Dry Wells

A dry well is a small pit usually filled with stone or gravel that stores some storm water runoff and allows it to slowly soak into the surrounding soil. Downspouts can be direct into the well or the well can be placed at a natural low spot to collect runoff. The function of a dry well is similar to that of a rain garden, but without the planting or maintenance. It can help to reduce the runoff on the property, and help with possible downstream flooding.



Any one, or combination of these projects can help reduce property runoff, enhance drainage, and control flooding. Helping to control runoff on residential properties has a larger impact on the community as it can reduce local flooding, and reduce the stress on local storm water infrastructure. In addition, there are environmental benefits including improvement to water quality. Whenever water is able to infiltrate, the soil helps to filter the water of contaminants and helps reduce the nutrient loads. Water that infiltrates can recharge groundwater, which eventually makes it to water supplies and waterbodies, so it is important not to deplete or contaminate the groundwater. 🌱


